and Exam Participation and Performance

This memorandum provides you with the information related to Advanced Placement (AP) and International Baccalaureate (IB) courses enrollment and exam participation and performance during the 2017–2018 school year. Furthermore, AP/IB exam participation and performance of Montgomery County Public Schools (MCPS) students is benchmarked with the results of public school students in Maryland and the nation.

Advanced Placement and International Baccalaureate Course Enrollment in MCPS

MCPS is committed to ensuring access and opportunity of all students to advanced-level courses. AP and IB courses serve as key components for a rigorous instructional program as well as experiences for college-level courses. Students who take AP or IB courses may participate in exams related to the course content. An AP exam score of 3 or higher or an IB exam score of 4 or higher is considered college ready. In 2018, all 25 MCPS comprehensive high schools offered AP courses and 8 schools provided IB programs (Attachment). Of all 25 high schools, 16 schools offered 30 or more AP/IB courses. Richard Montgomery (72), Bethesda-Chevy Chase (64), Albert Einstein (55), and Springbrook (55) high schools were the 4 high schools offering the most AP/IB courses.




Figure 1. Percentage of MCPS High School Students Enrolled in at Least One Advanced Placement/International Baccalaureate Course from 2016 to 2018

Districtwide, nearly 54.0 percent of MCPS high school students enrolled in at least one AP or IB course in 2018 (Figure 1). In the past three years, AP/IB course enrollment increased 5.9 percentage points. Given the number and course offerings of AP/IB content differ by high school, it is prudent to compare the AP/IB course enrollment across schools with caution.

In 2018, nearly 49.0 percent of male students in MCPS high schools enrolled in at least one AP/IB course, while slightly more than 59.0 percent of female students enrolled in one or more courses (Table 1). Among racial/ethnic groups, 74.4 percent of Asian, 67.1 percent of White, and 63.4 percent of Two or More Races students enrolled in one or more AP/IB courses. The AP/IB course enrollment rates for Black or African American and Hispanic/Latino students were 43.4 and 36.2 percent, respectively. Approximately 34.0 percent of high school students who received Free and Reduced-price Meals System (FARMS) services enrolled in at least one AP/IB course. The AP/IB course enrollment rates were 14.0 percent for those receiving Special Education and 18.5 percent for Limited English Proficiency (LEP) services. From 2016 to 2018, all student groups demonstrated increases in enrollment in AP/IB courses; Asian, Black or African American, Two or More Races students, and students receiving FARMS services increased more than 7.0 percentage points.

Further analysis by minority and poverty investigated one monitoring group, Non-FARMS All Other Student Groups, and five focus groups, Non-FARMS Black or African American, Non-FARMS Hispanic/Latino, FARMS All Other Student Groups, FARMS Black or African American, FARMS Hispanic/Latino. All focus groups increased their access to AP/IB courses from 2016 to 2018; FARMS All Other Student Groups made the largest gain in AP/IB course enrollment rate by 11.0 percentage points (Table 2).

Advanced Placement Exam Participation and Performance: MCPS, Maryland, and the Nation

The continued emphasis on rigorous course-taking resulted in 40,404 AP exams taken by MCPS students in 2018 with 28,604 of those tests having a score of 3 or higher (Table 3). The number of AP exams taken by MCPS students in 2018 accounted for 36.9 percent of all those taken by Maryland public school students, and the number of AP exams with scores of 3 or higher taken by MCPS students accounted for 39.9 percent of all those in Maryland.




Figure 2. Percentage of Advanced Placement Exams with a Score of 3 or Higher Taken by Public School Students in MCPS, Maryland and the Nation in 2018

The percentage of AP exams taken by MCPS students who attained scores of 3 or higher (70.8 percent) was 5.3 and 13.6 percentage points greater than those for public school students in the state of Maryland (65.5 percent) and the nation (57.2 percent), respectively (Figure 2).

MCPS students of all racial/ethnic groups exceeded the percentage of AP exams with scores of 3 or higher compared with the public school students in the state of Maryland and the nation. Among all racial/ethnic groups, the percentage of AP exams taken by MCPS Two or More Races students had the greatest difference (9.7 percentage points) compared to those in Maryland public schools (Table 4). Particularly noteworthy was the percentage of AP exams taken by MCPS Black or African American students earning scores of 3 or higher (47.1 percent), which was 17.2 percentage points greater than those in the nation (29.9 percent).

Advanced Placement Exam Participation and Performance Trends: MCPS, Maryland, and the Nation

From 2016 to 2018, the number of AP exams taken by MCPS students increased by 5,644 tests (Table 5). A similar upward trend was observed in Maryland (1,171 more tests) and the nation (336,768 more tests). Likewise, the number of AP exams taken by each racial/ethnic group in MCPS and the nation increased. In Maryland, the number of AP exams taken by Asian (2,002 more tests), Hispanic/Latino (1,203 more tests), and Two or More Races (587 more tests) public school students increased; however, the number of exams taken by Black or African American (1,517 less tests) and White (2,688 less tests) students decreased.

The percentage of AP exams with scores of 3 or greater taken by public school students in the state of Maryland and the nation increased 3.4 and 1.2 percentage points, respectively, while MCPS AP scores decreased 3.3 percentage points from 2016 to 2018 (Table 5). There were decreases among all racial/ethnic groups in MCPS, while the percentage of AP exam performance increased for all racial/ethnic groups in Maryland and the nation.

Advanced Placement Exam Participation and Performance: MCPS High Schools

MCPS high schools continued to support AP exam participation and performance of minority students. Between 2016 and 2018, 19 of the 25 high schools observed an increase in the number of AP exams taken by Black or African American students and 23 of the 25 high schools experienced an increase in the number of AP exams taken by Hispanic/Latino students (Table 6). In 12 of the 25 high schools, there was an increase in the percentage of AP exams with a score of 3 or higher taken by Black or African American students and in 9 of the 25 high schools, gains in the percentage of AP exams with a score of 3 or higher taken by Hispanic/Latino students. Ten of the 25 high schools noted increases for both AP exam participation and performance for Black or African American students; of those, Northwood High School demonstrated the greatest improvement (14.7 percentage points) in these students earning AP exam scores of 3 or higher. Eight of the 25 high schools exhibited increases for both AP exam participation and performance for Hispanic/Latino students; among these schools, Seneca Valley High School recorded the largest increase (34.4 percentage points) in these students earning AP exam scores of 3 or higher.

Among all focus groups that had the greatest number of high schools improving in AP exam participation, performance, or both, 21 high schools demonstrated an increase in the number of AP exams taken by Non-FARMS Hispanic/Latino from 2016 to 2018 and 13 high schools experienced an increase in the percentage of AP exams with scores of 3 or greater taken by Non-FARMS Black or African American students (Table 7). Eleven of the 25 high schools exhibited an increase in both AP exam participation and performance by Non-FARMS Black or African American students.

In 2018, the 20 AP exams most frequently taken by students in MCPS were: U.S. Government and Politics, English Language and Composition, World History, Psychology, English Literature and Composition, U.S. History, Calculus AB, Statistics, Biology, Calculus BC, Spanish Language, Environmental Science, Chemistry, Physics 1, Computer Science Principles, Microeconomics, Macroeconomics, Computer Science A, Physics C: Mechanics, and Human Geography.

At least 3 student groups experienced gains from 2016 to 2018 in both the number of exams taken and the percentage of AP exam scores of 3 or higher for Statistics, Physics C: Mechanics, and Spanish Language. The number of exams taken and the percentage of AP exam scores of 3 or higher increased for Calculus BC, Biology, Physics 1, Physics C: Mechanics, and Spanish Language for Black or African American students. Among Hispanic/Latino students, the number of exams taken and the percentage of AP exam scores of 3 or higher improved for Statistics, Physics C: Mechanics, and World History.

International Baccalaureate Exam Participation and Performance Trends: MCPS

In addition to AP courses, MCPS offers IB programs at eight high schools. The number of IB exams taken by MCPS students increased from 3,404 in 2016 to 4,127 in 2018 (Table 8). The same upward trend was evidenced among all racial/ethnic groups. The number of IB exams taken by Black or African American and Hispanic/Latino students increased by 332 and 227 tests, respectively. The percentage of IB exams with scores of 4 or higher taken by MCPS students decreased 8.6 percentage points in the last three years. The trend of IB performance for racial/ethnic groups declined as well. Among the racial/ethnic groups, the percentage of IB exams with a score of 4 or higher taken by Hispanic/Latino students noted the greatest decline (16.5 percentage points).

All focus groups realized gains in the number of IB exams from 2016 to 2018; Non-FARMS Black or African American (176), FARMS Black or African American (146), and FARMS Hispanic/Latino (144) had an increase of more than 140 tests (Table 9). Of all focus groups, the percentage of IB exams with scores of 4 or higher declined for all focus groups except FARMS Black or African American students (1.0 percentage point increase).

The positive trends in AP and IB course enrollment provide evidence of MCPS' continuing efforts to engage students in challenging and college-level contents for all students. The notable increases of participation in AP and IB exams indicate our commitment to close opportunity gaps. The results of AP and IB exam performance reveal that there is more work to do to support students' college readiness.
